The papers of John D. McKown contain personal correspondence, business papers, Civil War military papers, and documents concerning construction of Saline County, MO, courthouse.

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

John D. McKown, a carpenter and machinist in Saline County, Missouri, served with the Missouri State troops (Confederate) in the early days of the Civil War. He served in the Enrolled Missouri Militia July 1862-April 1863 and was commissioned Captain of McKown's Company (F), Second Battalion, Seventy-first Regiment, January 17, 1863.

During the war McKown was recruitment officer for Odon Guitar's Ninth Cavalry, Missouri State Militia, enrolling officer and deputy Provost Marshall for Saline County, Thirty-first-Thirty-fourth. Subdistricts, Sixth District of Missouri.

After the war McKown was construction superintendent and commissioner of the Saline County courthouse.
